

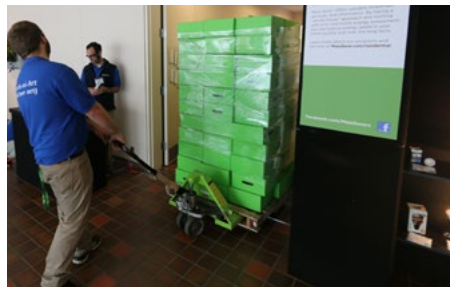

In The Neighborhood...

Minutes from our door, between Faneuil Hall and Christopher Columbus Park, quiet contemplation and reflection are at hand at the Greenway's Armenian Heritage Park. A gift to the City from Armenian-Americans, the park features an abstract sculpture atop a reflecting pool and a labyrinth.

The sculpture commemorates the immigrant experience, and is reconfigured every year to symbolize those pulled apart from their countries who came to the shores of Massachusetts.

The Labyrinth, a circular path of grass and inlaid stone with a jet of water at its center, is the only labyrinth on public land in the northeast. Its components symbolize life's journey, hope and rebirth. Art, Service, Science and Commerce are etched around its circle in tribute to Armenian contributions made to American life and culture.

While both a maze and a labyrinth are used for group ritual and private meditation, a labyrinth has a single path leading to its center. In Greek mythology, the Labyrinth was an elaborate structure designed and built by the legendary inventor Daedalus for King Minos of Crete. Its function was to hold the Minotaur, a mythical creature that was half man and half bull.
